

**1. CALL TO ORDER**

The meeting was called to order at 7:02 p.m. by Chair Yabroff

**2. ROLL CALL**

**PRESENT:** Chair Stephen Yabroff, Vice Chair Peter Tountas, Commissioners Nancy Montgomery, Lillie Clinton, Al Taylor, Rick Chatterton, Janine Brown (ex-officio), and Dominic Marzano (ex-officio).

**ABSENT:** None

Also present were City Manager Rich Leahy, Executive Assistant/Deputy City Clerk Linda Fava, and Councilmember Liz Aspen, Acting Council Liaison to the Emergency Preparedness Commission.

**3. FLAG SALUTE**

Chair Yabroff led the flag salute.

**4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

**a) November 9, 2009 & December 14, 2009**

**Vice Chair Tountas moved that the minutes of November 9, 2009 and December 14, 2009 be approved as written. Commissioner Chatterton seconded the motion.**

**Vote: All voted in favor of the motion, and the motion carried (6-0).**

**5. APPROVAL OF CONTENT AND ORDER**

Commissioner Chatterton requested the addition of a discussion regarding the public comment made by Chair Yabroff and Vice Chair Tountas at the recent City Council meeting. Chair Yabroff suggested it be addressed under Commission Reports.

**Vice Chair Tountas moved to approve the agenda in content and order as amended. Commissioner Chatterton seconded the motion.**

**Vote: All voted in favor of the motion, and the motion carried (6-0).**

9. **NEW BUSINESS**

**a) Public Safety Citizen Advisory Panel (CAP) Interviews**

Commissioners interviewed the following applicants for the Public Safety CAP: Dave Henry, Debra Sternagel, Greg Fazzio, Ken Anderson, and Carol Wallace. Interview questions included their interests and involvement in the community, why they wanted to volunteer, their specific or main concern regarding safety within the City, whether there was a particular cause or objective that motivated them to serve on this CAP, what they hoped to accomplish on the CAP, their vision for Woodinville for the next ten years, and their availability to attend CAP meetings.

**Vice Chair Tountas moved to invite Dave Henry, Debra Sternagel, Greg Fazzio, Ken Anderson, and Carol Wallace to become members of the Public Safety CAP. Commissioner Montgomery seconded the motion.**

**Vote: All voted in favor of the motion, and the motion carried (6-0).**

Chair Yabroff advised EPC Vice Chair Tountas, Commissioner Chatterton and City Councilmember Aspen will also participate on the CAP. Vice Chair Tountas will chair the CAP. The goal at the conclusion of the CAP meetings is to provide a list of recommendations for review by the EPC and forwarded to the City Council.

City Manager Rich Leahy reviewed Council action to form the Public Safety CAP, membership on the CAP (one Councilmember, one or more Emergency Preparedness Commissioners and up to five CAP members), and the term/duration of the CAP (two months or four meetings). He reviewed the CAP's work plan/schedule:

- Meeting 1: Briefing from staff about accident history and public safety issues
- Meeting 2: Identify and define the main safety issues, areas or locations
- Meeting 3: Review and evaluate possible solutions to the main safety issues, areas or locations
- Meeting 4: Prioritize issues, areas or locations

Chair Yabroff advised the first CAP meeting will be January 25; the EPC's meetings will be suspended until the CAP meetings concluded. He anticipated the CAP's recommendations would be presented at the EPC's March 22 meeting.

Vice Chair Tountas described his vision for the CAP, explaining the intent was an informal structure that did not follow Roberts Rules of Order, everyone was allowed to speak, there were no bad ideas, and members was encouraged to be respectful of one another. He invited members

to submit an exception report at the conclusion of the CAP if necessary. Chair Yabroff noted the CAP meetings are public and the public is encouraged to attend.

**b) Second Reading and Adoption of *Woodinville Weekly* Article #7 (Generator)**

Commissioners reviewed article #7 and made no revisions. The article is considered final.

**c) First Review of Article #8 (Emergency Communication)**

Article #8 was distributed and reviewed by the Commission.

**Commissioner Montgomery moved to accept the Personal Emergency Communication Planning article as amended, changing “out of town” to “out of state.” Vice Chair Tountas seconded the motion.**

**Vote: All voted in favor of the motion, and the motion carried (6-0).**

It was agreed draft articles #9 and #10 would be submitted to Ms. Fava who would email them to Commissioners for input.

**12. EMERGENCY MANAGER REPORTS – None**

**13. COMMISSIONER REPORTS**

Chair Yabroff explained that following the Commission’s December meeting, Vice Chair Tountas and he discussed the benefits of having only one Councilmember on the Public Safety CAP and to have the Police Chief attend the CAP meetings to respond to questions. He concluded the role of the Chair and Vice Chair may include speaking for the Commission when appropriate.

Commissioner Chatterton read an email expressing his concern that the Commission had not discussed the viewpoint offered by Chair Yabroff and Vice Chair Tountas at the January 5 City Council on behalf of the Emergency Preparedness Commission, requesting that only one Councilmember attend the CAP meetings and that the Police Chief attend all the CAP meetings. He was disappointed that two members of the Commission bypassed the Commission as a whole and spoke on behalf of the body without securing their input. He encouraged the Commission in the future to act as a collaborative team.

Councilmember Aspen provided the Council’s perspective that when a recommendation is presented on behalf of a Commission, the Council assumes it is representative of a majority of the Commission. A brief discussion followed regarding the role of the Chair and Vice Chair and how the issue would be handled in the future.

#### **14. PUBLIC COMMENT**

Dave Henry, Woodinville, suggested the EPC reach out to Neighborhood Associations to spread the message regarding emergency preparedness.

#### **15. UPCOMING AGENDA TOPICS**

Chair Yabroff requested staff email the Public Safety CAP members the time and date of the CAP meetings and the charter and request they bring topics and/or research regarding public safety issues to the first CAP meeting.

EPC meetings will be suspended for two months while the CAP meets.

#### **16. ADJOURNMENT**

**Commissioner Montgomery moved to adjourn the meeting. Commissioner Clinton seconded the motion.**

**Vote: All voted in favor of the motion, and the motion carried (6-0). The meeting was adjourned at 8:58 p.m.**

## Food Storage and Rotation (Draft)

An essential part of being prepared for an emergency is to assemble and properly store food and water. As previously discussed in these articles, you can spread the expense of gathering food and emergency supplies over several weeks. A chart of suggested items to purchase each week for 24-weeks can be downloaded from the Woodinville Website ([www.ci.woodinville.wa.us](http://www.ci.woodinville.wa.us)). Gather your family together to make a list of what you will eat in the event of an emergency and each time you go to the store, plan on buying at least one to five items from your list of food. Don't forget pets' needs and personal needs items. After you have all the necessities, get some fun foods, too. Once you have enough food and water for three days for the whole family, you can expand your storeroom to cover your needs for longer periods of time.

Proper storage and rotation of your essentials will help eliminate waste and limit the cost of being prepared. First, find an easy to access place in the house or garage with a fairly consistent temperature, as you do not want the food to get too hot or freeze. Store grains and other staples such as flour, corn meal and oats for long-term storage, wrapped in plastic, in watertight containers. Boxed goods should be placed in plastic and put in airtight containers. You should have at least one gallon of water for each family member and dog or cat per day. Store water in plastic containers such as 2-liter soft drink bottles. Larger containers designed specifically for water storage are available at local Army-Navy supply stores.

Try to purchase items with expiration dates that are seven to eleven months in the future. Make a list of all your items and the expiration dates. Then, every six months (mark your calendar!!!) rotate and replace items into your pantry that will expire within one to five months. Water should be replaced every six months. Wash the containers with hot soapy water and rinse thoroughly before refilling. Discard all expired items and canned foods in which the can has bulged or expanded.

## **Article 9 Earthquakes and You**

We have just seen the devastation of the Haitian earthquake. The Puget Sound area is also prone to earthquakes and experts tell us a big one is overdue. Although earthquakes strike without warning, being properly prepared and knowing how to react is key to surviving the initial quake, subsequent aftershocks, and aftermath.

**Getting prepared:** "Drop Cover Hold On" These few words, if practiced in advance, could save your life and minimize your personal injury. More people are injured in an earthquake by falling items or broken glass than any other means. Walk through your home with your family – today – and pick a safe place in each room to take cover. This could be under a table or against an interior wall with your neck and head covered by your arms. You will want to stay away from windows, large TVs, bookcases or tall unsecured furniture that could fall. If you are in bed, stay there, with your head covered with a pillow should a tremor strike.

Place a working flashlight, shoes, dust mask, and gloves into a hard hat and put one under the bed of each family member so when an earthquake hits during the night, they can locate these essential items. Learn how to shut off the gas, electricity and water. Attach a crescent wrench in a zip lock bag to the back of the gas meter that can be used, **ONLY IF YOU SMELL IT**, to shut off the gas.

Take time this weekend to implement some simple safeguards that will protect you and your family.

- Bolt and brace your water heater, any gas appliances, and tall furniture or large TVs to wall studs. More information is available at:

- Never hang heavy items near beds or couches.

**During an earthquake:** Remember, "Drop Cover Hold On" If you are outside when a quake hits, quickly move away from buildings, power lines, streetlights, and trees. If you are in a vehicle, pull over to a safe spot and avoid overpasses, bridges and ramps. Knowing and practicing these precautions and getting prepared, may save your life.

**ISSUE:** Shall the Commission receive and review the recommendations of the Public Safety Citizen Advisory Panel regarding pedestrian, bicyclist, motorist, and other public safety issues?

**POLICY ISSUE:** Previously, the City Council directed the Emergency Preparedness Commission to form a Citizen Advisory Panel (CAP) to advise the Commission on pedestrian, bicyclist, motorist, and other public safety issues.

On January 11, 2010, the Commission selected and appointed five citizens to the Public Safety CAP. In accordance with the City Council policy directive, the Public Safety CAP met on four occasions (in January, February, and March 2010) and completed its work on March 8, 2010.

The findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the Public Safety CAP are now ready for review by the Emergency Preparedness Commission.

**BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:** The Public Safety CAP followed a four phase approach to study analyze, and develop recommendations for its activities. Attached are materials that document and summarize the CAP's activities.

The CAP's recommendations were grouped/prioritized into three Phases. These phases were intended to identify achievable tasks in the immediate near term, short-term, and longer term periods. Please refer to Attachment 1 for final recommendations of the Public Safety CAP.

- ALTERNATIVES:** Following are possible alternatives for the Commission to consider:
1. Review, accept, and recommend the Public Safety CAP's recommendations as presented, to the City Council;
  2. Review, amend, and make a recommendation to the City Council;
  3. Schedule the matter for additional discussion by the Emergency Preparedness Commission at the April 12, 2010 Emergency Preparedness Commission Meeting.
