ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Woodinville from January 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the City. We also determined whether the City complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Financial condition
- Procurement (bidding/prevaling wages)
- Restricted funds
 - Building and land use fees
- Payroll/personnel
- Compliance with grant requirements
- Stormwater utility fees

RESULTS

In the areas we examined, the City's internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets. The City also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

The City of Woodinville was incorporated in March 1993 and currently serves a population of approximately 10,940 King County residents. The City has a council-manager form of government with an elected, seven-member Council. For fiscal years 2009 through 2010, the City had a budget of approximately \$25.6 million in operating revenue. The City's 57 full-time and part-time employees provide an array of services including parks and recreation, public works, community development and permitting.

We audit the City annually. The City has not received a finding in the past five years. However, in January 2010 we issued a report on a misappropriation of public resources totaling \$78,827.
