PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, in 1872, J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees, and

WHEREAS, Arbor Day was first observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska, and is now observed throughout the nation and the world; and

WHEREAS, trees reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce oxygen and provide habitat for wildlife; and

WHEREAS, trees are a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires and countless other wood products; and

WHEREAS, trees in our city increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community; and

WHEREAS, trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Woodinville has expressed its desire for the City to continue to be designated an official Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation and to continue tree planting and care efforts in the City,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Chuck Price, Mayor of the City of Woodinville, on behalf of the Woodinville City Council, do hereby proclaim April 29, 2011 as,

ARBOR DAY

in the **CITY of WOODINVILLE**, and urge all citizens to celebrate Arbor Day and support efforts to protect our trees and woodlands.

PLANT SPECIES LIST
(PROPOSED)**

The City of Woodinville Tree Board has developed the Plant Species List to assist the City, private developers and residents with the selection of plant materials for public and private properties. It was created as a resource to aid in the aesthetic and environmental quality of the City by encouraging the use of plants that preserve Woodinville's northwest woodland character.

The Plant Species List is intended to:

1. To encourage the use of hardy, attractive and easily maintained plant material that provides multi-season interest and is of an appropriate nature for use near City Right of Ways and public and private utilities.
2. To encourage the use of plants that should generally be available from local commercial wholesale and retail nurseries.
3. To provide visual continuity by using plant materials from the list's varieties and species.
4. To encourage the use of trees and shrubs as an important unifying element within the City to strengthen Woodinville's landscape character.

Species listed are suggestions to meet City landscape standards. Use of non-listed species may be permitted with approval from the City Tree Official. The City Tree Official on a case-by-case basis shall determine Street Tree species. Amendments to the List may be submitted to the Planning Department for Tree Board Consideration.

The List contains information on plants specific to name, type, size, form, features, exposure, and soil conditions, limitations near utilities and City Right of Ways and compliance with Woodinville Municipal Code Chapter 21.16 Development Standards for Tree Retention and Landscaping and WMC Section 21.12.200 Site Distance Requirements at Street Intersections for Landscaping and maintained per Public Works Detail No. 316 Driveway And Intersection Site Triangles.

The Plant Species List does not include wetland plants due to the specific nature of these plants. Please contact the City of Woodinville Planning Department, the Washington State Department of Ecology or a wetlands biologist for more information regarding wetland plants.

Included within the List is a Prohibited Plant Species List. This list was created to identify plants that offer no aesthetic or functional qualities to the community and are a threat to property and public safety. Plants on this list are prohibited from being planted within the City.

Accent Characteristics Legend* (Trees and Shrubs)

- G - **Flowering:** Plant produces showy flowers.
- C - **Fall Color:** Plant has showy fall color.
- V - **Colored Foliage/Variegation:** Plant has foliage color other than green or leaf variegation.
- W - **Wildlife:** Plant provides habitat or has characteristics that attracts wildlife.
- A - **Butterflies:** Plant has characteristics that attracts butterflies.
- F - **Fruiting/Berries:** Plant produces fruit or berries.

Restricted Use in Right of Ways and Near Utilities Legend** (Trees only)

- I - **Invasive Roots:** Plant has invasive root system potentially causing damage to underground utilities and sidewalks / streets.
- B - **Brittle Branches:** Plant with limbs that break easily in storms potentially causing damage to property and utilities.
- F - **Fruiting/Berries:** Plant producing fruit or berries creating unsightly sidewalks and parking lots.
- P - **Insects/Diseases:** Plant susceptible to insects or diseases creating messy sidewalks and parking lots or plant demise.
- L - **Power Lines:** Large plants with the ability to grow into overhead power lines causing outages and damage to power equipment.

Potential Hazards*** (Shrubs only)

- T - **Thorns:** Plant has thorns creating a hazard.
- B - **Bees:** Plant has characteristics that attracts bees.
- I - **Invasive Plant:** Plant has an aggressive root system causing it to spread.
- H - **Hardiness:** Plant has marginal hardiness during a severe winter.
- P - **Insects/Diseases:** Plant susceptible to insects or diseases.
- M - **Maintenance:** Plant has characteristics requiring additional maintenance.

A. Proposed Work Program Items 2011-2012
(These Items Can be prioritized)

Priority

- _____ Create specific criteria for tree groves in various public settings. This should include drawings as well as incorporating the ideas into code/standards etc., where it would be beneficial to the City of Woodinville in the development process.
- _____ Improve and update criteria for drought tolerant planting along roadways and open space areas.
- _____ Work with the Planning Commission to develop open spaces in a natural way consistent with the Woodland Character concepts.
- _____ Create specific public advisory materials demonstrating tree groves within a public setting.
- _____ Identify and prioritize opportunities to enhance existing publically owned critical area parcels in the City of Woodinville.
- _____ Recommend that these prioritized enhancements (replanting and maintenance of existing planted areas) be made a part of the next CIP process consistent with the role of the Tree Board in code.
- _____ Prioritize and map the areas for enhancement spending of funds consistent with other plans (WRIA/Shoreline Master Program), as well as the City of Woodinville's Urban Forestry Plan.
- _____ Make recommendations for property acquisitions to implement the Comprehensive Plan goals and objectives both citywide and downtown.
- _____ Recommend professional service contract amount to achieve the above mentioned goals and objectives.

B. Other Related Issues

- _____ Review Comprehensive Plan Strategies, make recommendations as to future changes.
- _____ Review Comprehensive Plan elements for consistency with the plan and regulations governing tree protection.

C. Proposed Tree Board Citizen Outreach Program

- **Annual Arbor Day:** updated Materials/Comprehensive Plan Update Open Houses 2012;
- **Spring Annual Garden Fair:** rotation from city to city within the Sammamish Valley;
- **Annual Updating of Public Information Materials:** advisory information updated each year for distribution, including tree permit information, comprehensive urban forestry plan, and review of existing development standards within the public realm.

About Tree Care

Trees make the natural environment more pleasant.

Properly placed and cared for trees increase the value of real estate. Trees decrease glare from pavement, reduce runoff, filter out pollutants, and add oxygen to the air. Street trees also improve the overall appearance and quality of life in a city or neighborhood.

To function well in the landscape, and provide these benefits, trees require maintenance. Watering, proper planting, corrective pruning and mulching will give trees a good start and maintain their health and beauty. The Tree Board recognizes that the health and beauty of the City's urban forest depends on maintenance of private trees by homeowners, not just maintenance of trees on public property. About the Heritage Tree Program

Have you seen a unique, unusual, fascinating tree in city limits? Are you curious about or want to preserve the history of a special tree? Think about nominating it for the Heritage Tree Program. This program promotes unique, healthy trees in the City of Woodinville. A "Heritage Tree" has valued, unique characteristics that set the tree(s) apart from other similar trees.

Characteristics may include:

- § Genus
- § Species
- § Form
- § Size
- § Location
- § Historic Significance
- § Other desirable features

A city-approved recognition plaque will be placed at any officially designated heritage tree(s). The tree(s), nominee and property owner will receive special recognition from the City Council.

Nominate a Heritage Tree

Any City resident or City business owner may nominate a tree(s) for "heritage" status. Written nominations are reviewed by the Tree Board and recommendations are forwarded to the City Council.

The property owner where the nominated tree(s) is located must sign a consent statement on the Nominating Form. If accepted, the property owner agrees to allow the tree to be placed on a Heritage Tree map.

About the Woodinville Tree Board

The Woodinville Tree Board is a 5-member volunteer advisory board to the City Council. The Board makes policy recommendations regarding tree related issues such as tree preservation, planting, and care.

The board maintains the City's Tree City USA status as well as updates the Community Urban forestry Plan. This Plan's purpose is to assist the City Council, Tree Board, City staff and citizens to build a self-sustaining community urban forestry plan focusing on tree preservation and protection.

In addition to policy guidance, the Board plans community education events and activities including Arbor Day, held annually in April

Thanks to the efforts of the Tree Board since its inception in 1995, the following programs and regulations have been created to support the City's mission for proper and lasting tree care and preservation:

- Heritage Tree Program
- Tree Tribute program
- Community Urban Forestry Plan
- Tree Retention and Protection Regulations

About the Tree Tribute Program


A Tree Tribute Grove is a meaningful, lasting way to remember or commemorate a special person or event. The city will help you develop a planting plan, assist with the planting and coordinate a tribute event at a time of or after the planting.

A marker will be installed at the Tree Tribute Grove location. Maintenance of the grove is the responsibility of the City.

By definition, the grove must consist of at least three 930 trees planted in a natural setting in one of the City's parks or streetscapes.



The first Tree Tribute Grove was planted at Wilmot Gateway Park in 2004.

Written requests, including proposed location and proposed species, should be submitted to the City's

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
